To His Excellency, Robert Lowry, Governor of the State of Mississippi:

SIR—In accordance with usage and the laws governing this Department, I have prepared and submit herewith my report for the two fiscal years commencing on the 1st day of January, 1884, and closing with the 31st day of December, 1885.

Exhibit "A" shows an itemized account with the Public Printer.

Exhibit "B" shows sales of Chickasaw school lands made since my last report.

Exhibit "C" shows vote by counties, had at recent election for Governor and other State officers.

Exhibit "D" gives list of Senators, Representatives, County and Beat officers chosen at the late election, together with a full list of all officers that have been commissioned since my last report.

Exhibit "E" shows list of Commissioners of Deeds for the State of Mississippi resident in other States, who have been commissioned during the last two years.

Exhibit "F" gives a list of all public documents that have been distributed.

Exhibit "G" shows account of sales of Revised Codes of 1880 and 1871, and Mississippi Reports.

Exhibit "H" shows abstracts of all charters granted from this office under chapter 38, of the Revised Code of 1880, and the amendments thereto.

I would suggest to your Excellency the propriety of the next Legislature reducing the present price of the Chickasaw lands. Six dollars per acre is more than most any one would wish to pay for wild lands of this character. If the price of these lands was reduced to, say, two or three dollars per acre, there would be no difficulty in the State disposing of them, but if the State continues to hold them at the present price, there will continue to be very little demand for them.

I would suggest further, that some authority should be granted the Secretary of State to replace, by purchase, the many volumes

of Mississippi Reports that are now, and have been for many years, missing from the library belonging to this office. There is not a session of the Legislature held but that some act is passed requiring this office to furnish certain reports to counties where the same have been lost or destroyed. It is impossible for the Secretary of State to comply with such acts, for want of books named therein. The present incumbent has, during his administration of said office, made a great many exchanges of late Reports, (of which there is a surplus) for old ones, thereby, in a measure, supplying the broken volumes; but it happens quite often that these old Reports could be purchased, whereas the parties holding them do not wish to exchange.

I wish to make a further suggestion while on this subject of Supreme Court Reports, and it is this: Under section 265, Revised Code of 1880, the Secretary of State is required to make certain distribution of Supreme Court Reports, when the number to which the State is entitled shall have been delivered by the Supreme Court Reporter; and after making said distribution, as defined in said section, he is required to deposit the residue in the State Library. Previous to the adoption of said section above referred to, all Supreme Court Reports were deposited in the library room belonging to this office. Unless some change is made, confusion is likely to arise in the future, and I would suggest, therefore, that the law be so amended as to require either the State Librarian or the Secretary of State to keep all of said Reports. I submit that the duty should most properly fall on the Secretary of State, as that officer is required, under the law, to make distribution of all public documents-
