Write me real ofter as your letters will be great when I are in other lands from my own. you will not hear from me very often but you know that I will write as of ten as I can. The nuffler, sweater and sor were all appreciated and they certainly conce in fine in This cold clinate. Mrs, Cage was certainly looking fine. We have all kinds famusements such as trying to catch a jelly fish in a small backet and every thing else that one can think of. To-day was the first time in several days that we had a chance
