Sunday Oct 14/1917

My dearest Mother,

This is certainly a beautiful Sunday morning and we had the pleasure of sleeping until 7 o'clock. On Sunday morning we have our le petit déjeuner at 7<sup>30</sup>. It is only a cup of chocolate and some bread and butter. At 11<sup>30</sup> we have luncheon and at 7<sup>PM</sup> we have dinner. I am getting along fine and the regular work and habits agrees with me. Last week we had a very light schedule but the one for this coming week is very heavy, and above all that I am section chief which will take up my noon hour and part of my other spare time. Instead of automobiles we use horses and bicycles.

We have horse riding (equitation) every day and the worst handicap is that we do not use stirrups. The sections were again divided this morning and I am now

rooming with Ralph a Kelly from  
Lifford, Ohio, who was in the  
battery with me at Fort Rook. He  
is one of those fine Irish speci-  
men who you can depend  
on as being a good friend.

I did not get to finish  
your letter this morning so  
I am finishing it this evening.  
We had a fine walk this after-  
noon and saw some beautiful  
views. Four of us in the party were  
John Roukas, Monk, Kelly and I. I am to  
get paid for the first time in over  
a month to-night. Most all the crowd  
are nearly broke and I had some  
left so I have been the up-keep of  
our bunch since I came here. John R. and  
Monk are just across the hall from  
me so I am near to them. We have  
managed so far to stay to-gether during  
all the changes that have been made  
and I don't think there will be any  
more soon. Saw Hugh Sutherland, the  
It that roomed with me in  
N.Y. for the first time to-day

and he has been here all the time but you are kept busy and have little time to look up old acquaintances.

I have not yet received a letter from any one. I think I will be here for some time so be sure and keep letters from some one every day and if any thing unusual happens to me I will send you a telegram. So do not worry about me and have the two boys to write me at once. The many fine saddle horses here would certainly be interesting to Daddy and this is supposed to be about the best riding school in the world. Old "Lightfoot" would have good company here.

I have often wondered how "Mike" is getting along in the Artillery at Clinton and wish I could hear from him. I could easily ask a hundred questions about all the home folks and our little

city of Clarkdale but just write  
me fevery thing and real often.  
you really couldnt send me  
to much mail for it certainly  
will look good when it does  
come.
