Friday. Oct. 26th 1917.

My dearest Mother.

Yesterday morning on returning to get my noon-day meal I found eight letters awaiting me. They have been read and reread several times. I had finished driving a rough pair of lead horses all morning and to come in

and have the pleasure
of reading letters it seems
to good to be true. My
room-mate received his
first letter this morning.
Three of my letters were
from you and I had
a fine letter from
aunt Mattie and also
one from "Pete" Lavender.
I would have answered

them all last night but had to
go take a french lesson and
then make out allotments blanks
for my section. Our bunch
here of about 400 men subscribed
~~\$7450~~ ^{\$74050} to the Second Liberty
(Seventy four thousand and fifty)
Bond Loan. I have been section
chief for two weeks now and
hope my time is about up.
You have to make out
reports and keep lists of
your section and be on
hand all the time.

I guess Daddy's new car
is a roadster. I am glad
that he likes it so well. A
Ford would even look

good here in the
land of Bicycles and
cobble stones. I am
glad that you sent the
Register to me and hope
to receive some numbers
soon. We are being put
through here now and
the many examinations
seem to be the worst

part of this war game over
here.

I am really glad
you sent Sister
to Washington instead
of New York. I believe
she will like it
much better. I am
sorry that Lois did
not come to tell you

good-bye. I was nice as
I could be to her when I
was at home. Have the
two boys to write to me
for I haven't time to do
anything with the schedule
before us now. Next week
we should start in the
real firing of the big
guns. And after that
we will have it every
day. I had my bonds
made payable to you and
when they are fully paid for,
will be sent direct to
you from Washington.

I certainly enjoyed
your letters and
will write to every
one as soon as I
possibly can. Give
Mr & Mrs Frierson my
best regards and tell
Mrs Frierson that I
am very much in love

with her country although
it does not look the
same as I imagine
it did only a few
years ago. Give my
love to Aunt Jennie
and to all.
