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








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

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


STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

Under the direction of strength and conditioning coach Chas Ossenheimer, the Ole Miss women's tennis team utilizes the Gillom Athletics Performance Center weight room to maximize their athletic potential both in-season and out of season.

The Gillom Center weight room is equipped with:

- 16 platforms and ½ rack stations equipped with Olympic and power bars, eight sets of chains, eight tendo units, and over 10,000 lbs. of weight
- An assortment of speciality bars including: trapbars, safety squat bars, Texas squat bars and duffalo bars
- 120 dumbells ranging from 5-100lbs., 38 kettlebells ranging from 18-97 lbs., and a full compliment of bands
- Medball rack with over 50 medicine balls ranging from 6-100 lbs. and a medball throwing wall
- Three Pit Sharks, six GHRs, and various specialty machines and attachments
- 16 pieces of cardio equipment including: TrueForm Runners, Woodway treadmills, Assault Bikes and Versaclimbers
- 1,728 square-foot field turf w/ plyo boxes and hurdles, pushing and speed sleds
- · Gatorade fueling station









PALMER/SALLOUM TENNIS CENTER

The University of Mississippi's Palmer/Salloum Tennis Center ranks as one of the nation's finest collegiate facilities. Located in the heart of campus and surrounded by towering magnolia trees, the tennis center (completed in 1990) underwent dramatic enhancements in 2012, complementing an already stunning facility.

The \$2 million expansion included improving player and coach areas with a new team building for both the men's and women's team--with locker rooms and team meeting rooms--while the existing building was renovated to include new offices for both head coaches and assistant coaches as well as visiting lockerrooms and a stringing room. Rooftop pavilions above each team building provide additional viewing for fans to enjoy all the exciting action. Additional renovations included a gameday operations box next to the pavilion between courts two and five.

A new computerized scoreboard and message center was added in 2011, along with smaller scoreboards on each court providing fans point-by-point scoring for all six courts during each match.

The complex combines the Greek revival architecture that is predominant on the Oxford campus, housing a 500-seat stadium. Courtside pavilions provide additional seating for 300, giving fans the opportunity to be right on top of the action. The varsity facility has nine championship courts all with lighting.

The Palmer/Salloum Tennis Center has served as host to SEC Championships, most recently, the 2012 SEC Women's Tennis Championship. In 2013, the facility will host the SEC Men's Tennis Championship. Other events at the Tennis Center include Women's ITA South Regional Championships, the USTA National Interscholastic Championships and numerous NCAA Men's and

Women's first and second rounds, including in 2012.


Legendary Ole Miss men's head coach Billy Chadwick, who coached the Rebels for 35 years, steered the development of the center from its inception.

"Our objective was to build a state of the art tennis center that would enhance and compliment the beauty of the campus," Chadwick said. "With the renovations, it is a showplace for the University. When Palmer/Salloum was built, the objective of creating a state-of-the-art tennis center was met. The expansion is a compliment to the existing space and advances our facilities even further."

The primary benefactor of the tennis center is John N. Palmer, a 1956 alumnus of Ole Miss, who is currently the U.S. Ambassador to Portugal. He was joined in this effort by Mitchell Salloum Jr., a businessman from Gulfport, who is a 1955 alumnus of the University. The center honors the late Mitchell Salloum, Sr., a 1926 law graduate and a 1960-61 President of the Ole Miss Alumni Association. Additional funds were provided by donations to the Drive for Athletics at Ole Miss. Donors who made significant gifts toward other parts of the stadium include Louis Brandt, Jack Dunbar and William Galtney.

Galtney contributed \$1 million to the renovation/expansion, and in recognition of his generous donation, the courts were named the William F. Galtney, Jr., Tennis Courts.





WILLIAM F. GALTNEY INDOOR TENNIS CENTER

The Ole Miss men's and women's tennis teams received a huge boost in January of 2018, with the opening of the 11-million dollar William F. Galtney Indoor Tennis Center.

The facility features six indoor courts with individual scoreboards on each one and a big scoreboard at the end by court six. It also features seating for 300 across all six courts allowing for maximum viewing.

The project was first announced as part of the Forward Together campaign in 2015.

The building was formally dedicated in February of 2019, with benefactor William F. Galtney present for the ribbon cutting. Galtney, a Jackson, Miss., native, attended Ole Miss, graduating in 1974 as a member of the tennis team. He went on to recieve his Master's in 1976.









OUTSTANDING ATHLETICS

From Olympic gold medalist to Super Bowl winner to World Series champion, Ole Miss Rebels can be found at the pinnacle of many sports.

(Clockwise from top) - Ole Miss Baseball won its 10th NCAA Regional title in 2019, and was well on its way to a historic season in 2020 before the global coronavirus pandemic cut the year short; Rafaelle Souza was a starting defender on the Brazilian national team during the 2015 Women's World Cup and played in the 2016 Rio Olympics; Oxford native and American pole vault record holder Sam Kendricks was an Olympic bronze medalist in 2016 and has claimed nine of the last 10 U.S. pole vault titles he has competed in; Seven-time world champion, 12-time USA champion and 2012 Olympic gold medal long jumper Brittney Reese has competed for Team USA in three Olympiads in Beijing (2008), London (2012) and Rio (2016); Aaron Barrett was a member of the 2019 World Series Champion Washington Nationals pitching staff, the 13th Rebel to be on a World Series winning team.

Ole Miss has won five SEC team titles in the last four years

2019: Men's Cross Country



Ole Miss **Men's Cross Country** repeated as SEC Champions in dominant fashion, recording the largest margin of victory in the SEC since 2015 with a 55-point win over Alabama. The Rebel men were ranked as high as No. 8 nationally during the year, a program-best.

2019: Women's Golf



Women's Golf won the 2019 SEC Championship in thrilling fashion, needing playoff holes in its final three matches before prevailing over South Carolina. Ole Miss went on to qualify for the NCAA Championships for the second time in as many years, finishing tied for 13th overall.

2018: Men's Cross Country



Ole Miss won the 2018 SEC Men's Cross Country title, the first in program history and the first school not named Arkansas or Alabama to win since 1990. The Rebel men went on to win the NCAA South Region title and finish 17th at the NCAA Championships, the second-best national team finish in program history.

2018: Baseball (SEC Tournament Champions)




Baseball won its third SEC Tournament title in dramatic fashion in 2018, battling back with four straight wins after falling to Auburn in the opening round. Nick Fortes was named Tournament MVP, and was one of three Rebels on the All-Tournament Team.

2017: Softball (SEC Tournament Champions)



Softball wrote and starred in its own Cinderella story in 2017, winning the SEC Tournament title as the No. 8 seed on the arm of Tournament MVP, Kaitlin Lee. Ole Miss became the lowest seed to ever make the title game, let alone win the tournament, and beat No. 1 seed Florida, No. 5 seed Alabama and No. 6 seed LSU along the way for the title.



He's won two national championships in Division II, led teams to the SEC West Championship and NCAA Sweet Sixteen. He's coached a national champion and Honda Sports Award winner and numerous All-Americans and All-SEC players. His teams are notorious for excellence in the classroom. Mark Beyers has accomplished a lot in over 20 years as a head coach and became the all-time winningest coach in program history in 2019.

The 2020 season was shortened due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Rebels competed in 14 matches earning a 9-5 overall record (1-3 SEC). Most notably, the team defeated No. 14 UCF on the road, 4-3. The team finished the season ranked No. 29 nationally. Off the court the Rebels were spectacular as well. Academically, the team had a perfect 4.0 GPA for the spring semester and seven team members were named ITA Scholar Athletes. Also, the Rebels made huge contributions in the community. Alexa Bortles earned the ITA Southern Region Arthur Ashe Leadership and Sportsmanship Award and Anna Vrbenska was named to the SEC Community Service Team.

While 2019 was the first time in 11 years that the Rebels did not attend the NCAA Tournament, Ole Miss still turned in notable performances. Senior Tea Jandric was named the ITA Southern Region's Most Improved Senior and was also dubbed with All-SEC Second Team recognition. Jandric went 8-1 in league play, including four ranked wins and three in a row, including taking down No. 4 Contreras of Vanderbilt. Thensophomore Sabina Machalova was named the ITA Southern Region's Player to Watch. In the fall, Jandric reached the finals of the ITA Southern Regional, and the pair of Alexa Bortles and rookie Isolde de Jong also reached the finals, falling in a tough three-set thriller to the reigning national champions. The women ended their season with a huge upset, taking down No. 16 Texas A&M 4-2 on Senior Day.

The 2018 season was a historic one for the Rebels that ended with senior Arianne Hartono becoming the first NCAA Champion in program history. Hartono led the Rebels to their first 20-win season (22-7) since 1999, the NCAA Sweet Sixteen, the most wins in SEC play (9-4), their best finish in the SEC (5th) since 2012 and a final ranking of No. 8,

the highest since 1999. Hartono capped a great team season by winning storming through the NCAA singles bracket to win the championship. In addition to winning the NCAA title, Hartono became the first player in program history to be named SEC Player of the Year as well as the first in school history to receive a Honda Sports Award (Tennis). A record five players earned All-SEC honors, with Alexa Bortles, Sabina Machalova, Tea Jandric and Anna Vrbenska joining Hartono on the teams. Beyers earned ITA Southern Region Coach of the Year honors for the third time in his career. Off the court, the Rebels posted a 3.40 grade point average and earned the ITA All-Academic Team Award for the 22nd year in a row.

Eleven SEC teams ended the 2017 season in the top 25 and 13 of the 14 made the NCAA Tournament, including the Rebels, who earned their ninth straight bid and advanced to the second round. Arianne Hartono competed in the NCAA singles and doubles with Alexa Bortles. Hartono earned All-SEC First Team honors. Ole Miss became the first No. 4 seed to to advance from the ITA Kick-Off to the National Team Indoor Championships, when they beat Virginia and LSU to reach the national indoor for the first time since 2012. Off the court, the Rebels earned the prestigious ITA All-Academic Team Award for the 21st year in a row and six players were named ITA Scholar-Athletes.

In 2016, the Rebels earned their eighth straight NCAA appearance and defeated reigning NCAA Champion Stanford for the first time in program history. Arianne Hartono became the 12th All-American in the history of the program reaching the round of 16 at the NCAA Singles Championship. She also made the All-SEC Team. Seniors Mai El Kamash and Marija Milutinovic picked up ITA Regional honors, earning the Arthur Ashe Sportsmanship and Leadership Award and the Cissie Leary Sportsmanship Award, respectively. Off the court, the Rebels received the ITA All-Academic Team Award for the 20th time and six players were named ITA Scholar-Athletes. Hartono was one of nine players in Division I tennis to earn All-America and ITA Scholar-Athlete honors.

For the fourth time in seven years, Ole Miss finished the year ranked in the top 25, earning a

final ranking of No. 24 in 2015. The Rebels earned their seventh consecutive NCAA bid and advanced to the second round, narrowly missing out on reaching the Sweet Sixteen. Julia Jones became the 11th All-American in the history of the program and the seventh member of the 100-wins club. She

made the SEC All-Freshman Team and ended her first year ranked No. 79. Off the court, the Rebels earned the ITA All-Academic Team Award and six players were named ITA Scholar-Athletes.

The Rebels made their sixth consecutive and 17th overall NCAA appearance in 2014 and advanced to the second round before falling to the eventual national champion, UCLA. Julia Jones earned All-SEC second team honors. Off the court, the Rebels earned the ITA All-Academic Team Award and Caroline Rohde-Moe was named to the CoSIDA



Capital One Academic All-District Team.

Youth was the name of the game in 2013, as the Rebels did not feature a senior on the team and only two juniors. They earned the program's 16th overall NCAA appearance, and junior Caroline Rohde-Moe participated in the NCAA Singles Championship as well as earned All-SEC honors for the second time. Off the court, the Rebels were one of the best, earning an APR Public Recognition Award and leading all sports at Ole Miss with a 3.64 team GPA in the spring.

In 2012, the Rebels earned their fourth straight NCAA appearance and a final national ranking of No. 18. It marked the third time in the last four years for the Rebels to end the year ranked in the Top 25. The Rebels (18-9) hosted the NCAA first and second rounds for the first time since 1999 and finished among the top four in the overall SEC standings for the second time in three years. The 18 wins are the most since the 1999 team posted 21. The Rebels also advanced to the National Team Indoor Final 16 for the first time since 2000. Kristi Boxx and Abby Guthrie earned All-America honors and were joined on the All-SEC team by Caroline Rohde-Moe and freshman Erin Stephens. Julia Jones made the All-Freshman team along with Stephens.

Beyers was named ITA Southern Region Coach of the Year for the second time in three years in 2012.

The Rebels enjoyed an excellent year in the classroom, earning the ITA All-Academic Team

Award for the 16th consecutive time, while three players earned ITA Scholar-Athlete recognition. Gabby Rangel was a finalist for the SEC Boyd McWhorter Scholar-Athlete Postgraduate Scholarship and received a Taylor Medal (highest academic honor at University).

Despite dealing with injuries to key players in 2011, the Rebels earned their third straight NCAA bid. Kristi Boxx earned All-SEC first team honors for the third year in a row. Connor Vogel made the second team.

Off the court, the team received the ITA All-Academic Team Award as well as earning the Chancellor's Cup for the varsity team with the highest cumulative grade point average.

Ole Miss advanced to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen for the eighth time in 2010, captured the SEC West Championship and reached the SEC tournament semifinals for the second year in a row. The Rebels ended the year ranked No. 17 in the nation, posted their best finish in the SEC (2nd) since 1999 and their best league record (8-3) since 2000. Kristi Boxx and Karen Nijssen earned All-America honors, while Boxx was one of only nine players in the nation to earn the honor in both singles and doubles. Laura van de Stroet and Connor Vogel joined Boxx and Nijssen on the All-SEC team.

Academic success continued for the Rebels as they earned the Chancellor's Cup for the women's varsity squad with the highest cumulative grade point average. They also received the ITA AllAcademic Team Award for the 14th time, while four players were named ITA Scholar-Athletes.

The Rebels ended the 2009 season ranked No. 21 in the nation and advanced to the NCAA second round. With three freshmen and two sophomores in the lineup, Ole Miss defeated five top 25 teams in league play and reached the semifinals of the SEC Tournament. Kristi Boxx and Karen Nijssen earned All-SEC honors and participated in the NCAA Doubles Championship. Boxx also made the singles championship.

Off the court, the Rebels earned the prestigious ITA All-Academic Team Award, and Gabby Rangel and Laura van de Stroet were named ITA Scholar-Athletes.

In 2008, Karen Nijssen earned All-SEC honors in her first year with the Rebels. She also teamed with Nika Koukhartchouk to participate in the NCAA Doubles Championships. The pair ended the year ranked No. 32 in the nation.

Off the court, Ole Miss garnered the ITA All-Academic Team Award for the 12th time. Two members of the team were named ITA Scholar-Athletes. For the first time ever, the team also earned the Chancellor's Cup for the highest grade point average among all women's varsity sports at Ole Miss. Preethi Subramanian was named to the Arthur Ashe Jr. Sports Scholars by the journal Diverse: Issues In Higher Education.

In 2007, senior Ilona Somers, earned All-SEC hon-

ors for the second year in a row, ended the year ranked No. 46 in the nation and qualified for the NCAA Singles Championship. In the classroom, Ole Miss received the ITA All-Academic Team Award. Four members of the team earned ITA Scholar-Athlete honors.

In 2006, Ole Miss boasted the SEC Co-Freshman of the Year, in addition to Ilona Somers making the All-SEC second team. Off the court, the Lady Rebels received the distinction of being named an ITA All-Academic team. Also, the entire starting lineup earned ITA Scholar-Athlete honors, believed to be not matched by any other squad in the country.

The 2005 season saw the Rebels capture the SEC Western Division Championship for the first time. In addition, the team made its 11th NCAA Championship appearance. Chloe Carlotti became the seventh All-American in the history of the program and joined an elite group of Division I players to earn that distinction at multiple schools. Carlotti and Virginia Tomatis earned All-SEC honors after going 8-3 in the league at No. 1 doubles.

The 2004 season saw the Lady Rebels narrowly miss making the NCAA Team Championships, but there were plenty of highlights to be noted. Chloe Carlotti and Virginia Tomatis teamed up to post an 8-3 record in the SEC at No. 1 doubles and earn



All-SEC honors. Carlotti participated in the NCAA Championships in singles and teamed up with Tomatis in doubles. Off the court, the Lady Rebels were named an ITA All-Academic Team. Florencia Basile, Karem Harboe, Sabrina Peppl and Virginia Tomatis were named ITA Scholar-Athletes and to the SEC Academic Honor Roll.

In 2003, current University of Wisconsin assistant coach Mira Radu completed an outstanding career by being named the NCAA Woman of the Year for the state of Mississippi.

Radu earned All-America honors for the second consecutive year as well as All-SEC accolades. Radu finished her senior year ranked No. 18 in the nation and reached the quarterfinals of the NCAA Singles Championships. The winner of the 2003 ITA South Region Cissie Leary Award for Sportsmanship, Radu became only the fourth Lady Rebel ever to record 100 wins for her career, finishing with a 108-52 career record. Radu was also the corecipient of the Eugenia Conner Memorial Award, which is given to the most outstanding female athlete on the Ole Miss campus each spring.

Off the court in the 2003, the Lady Rebels earned the ITA All-Academic Team Award. Radu made the SEC Academic Honor Roll, and Florencia Basile, Karem Harboe and Virginia Tomatis were named ITA Scholar Athletes.

During his first season (2002) at the helm, Beyers guided the Lady Rebels to their seventh consecutive NCAA appearance and a final national ranking of No. 35. He also coached Mira Radu to All-America and All-SEC honors. Radu ended the year ranked among the top 20 singles players. Radu and 2002 graduate Camilla Gould earned the ITA Scholar-Athlete Award, while the squad was named an ITA All-Academic Team.

No stranger to women's tennis, Beyers, a native of Tilburg, Holland, spent three years (1992-95) as head coach of the women's tennis team at Armstrong Atlantic State in Georgia. During his three years, the team captured the NCAA Division II Championship, posted a 50-8 record and won the Peach Belt Conference each year. Beyers earned PBC Coach-of-the-Year honors in 1993, 1994 and 1995. In 1995, he received NCAA Division II South Regional Coach-of-the-Year honors. His teams ranked 10th, ninth and first respectively in the Division II national rankings.

Beyers came to Ole Miss in the fall of 1995 as the men's assistant coach. In his six years as an as-

sistant coach with the Rebels, Ole Miss reached the final four twice (1997, 1999) and won three SEC titles (1996, 1997, 1999). In 1997, Beyers was the first recipient of the ITA Region III Assistant Coach-of-the-Year Award.

During his 25 years of coaching collegiate tennis as an assistant and head coach, Beyers has coached 25 All-Americans, 47 ITA Scholar-Athletes and 20 teams that have received the ITA All-Academic Team Award.

As a collegiate player at Armstrong Atlantic State, Beyers earned four letters, posted a 99-21 record and led his team to a national ranking of No. 4. He earned All-America honors twice in doubles and singles.

Beyers received a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science from Armstrong Atlantic State in 1991. After graduating, Beyers enjoyed a brief professional career on the satellite tour before returning to his alma mater to coach the women's team.

In 1998, Beyers became the youngest person ever to be inducted into the Armstrong Atlantic State Athletic Hall of Fame. In 2016, he was selected as one of 75 notable alumni for Armstrong Atlantic University's 75th anniversary.

In July of 2005, Beyers married the former Lauren Dorcheus. The couple resides in Oxford.

Grant Roberts joined Ole Miss in the spring of 2018 and immediately made a big impact on the Rebels, helping them to a historic season in 2018, including the program's first national champion, Arianne Hartono.

The 2020 season was shortened due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Rebels competed in 14 matches earning a 9-5 overall record (1-3 SEC). Most notably, the team defeated No. 14 UCF on the road 4-3. The Rebels defeated the Knights in just under four hours. Tereza Janatova clinched the match with a third set tiebreak victory on court three. At home the team compiled a 7-3 record including a 4-1 victory over Roberts' alma mater Kentucky. During Roberts' first three seasons the Rebels won over two-thirds of all home matches (23-11, .677).

In his second season in 2019, Roberts helped guide senior Tea Jandric to the ITA Southern Region's Most Improved Senior and was also dubbed with All-SEC Second Team recognition. Jandric went 8-1 in league play, including four ranked wins and three in a row, including taking down No. 4 Contreras of Vanderbilt. Then-sophomore Sabina Machalova was named the ITA Southern Region's Player to Watch. In the fall, Jandric reached the finals of the ITA Southern Regional, and the pair of Alexa Bortles and rookie Isolde de Jong also reached the finals, falling in a tough three-set thriller to the reigning national champions. The women ended their season with a huge upset, taking down No. 16 Texas A&M 4-2 on Senior Day.

In his first season, Roberts assisted head coach Mark Beyers in leading the Rebels to their first 20-win season (22-7) since 1999, the NCAA Sweet Sixteen, the most wins in SEC play (9-4), their best finish in the SEC (5th) since 2012 and a final ranking of No. 8, the highest since 1999. Roberts was on senior Arianne Hartono's court when she made a historic run to the NCAA Singles Championship, becoming the first NCAA Champion in program history. He also helped coach All-SEC honorees Alexa Bortles, Sabina Machalova, Tea Jandric and Anna Vrbenska.

Roberts arrived in Oxford after serving as the women's assistant coach at Colorado. Prior to that, he was a volunteer assistant coach for the men's team at

the University of Kentucky for three years.

He helped the Wildcats reach the semifinals of the NCAA Tournament in 2014 where the team finished 13th overall in the country. Roberts worked with ITA Ohio Valley Region Player to Watch, William Bushamuka who became a first-team All-SEC selection and a first team All-American in 2017. Roberts also worked with SEC Co-Freshman of the Year, Rvotaro Matsumura in 2016, Matsumura also earned ITA Ohio Valley Region Rookie of the Year honors and was named to the All-SEC second team. Roberts was a standout player at Kentucky. Despite battling injuries, he helped lead the Wildcats to the 2012 SEC Championship and the NCAA Sweet 16 three times, including the quarterfinals in 2010. Roberts is Kentucky's all-time leader in matches clinched.

In the classroom, Roberts was named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll three straight years.

Roberts earned his bachelor's degree in communications at the University of Kentucky in 2014.

Most recently, Bolton served as the teaching pro at Manker Patten Tennis Club in Chattanooga. While there, he conducted private lessons and group clinics with adults and juniors of all skills and levels, leaving a legacy of new and exciting training opportunities for members of all ages.

When in Destin, Bolton spent several years at Bluewater Bay, working and training with various pros playing on the ITR Futures Circuit and up and coming collegiate players.

A native of Chattanooga, Bolton was ranked in the Top 20 in the Tennessee Junior rankings before starting his collegiate career at top-ranked NAIA program Tennessee Wesleyan and finishing at UT-Chattanooga.

PALOMA COLLANTES 1991, 1992, 1993, 1994

Paloma Collantes was arguably the best player in the history of the women's tennis program at Ole Miss. She became the first Rebel All-America in singles in 1991, her freshman year. That year, Collantes reached the quarterfinals of the NCAA Championships before losing to defending national champion Debbie Graham of Stanford 6-4, 4-6, 6-2.

The native of Miami, Fla., won the Riviera All-American Championships twice in her four-year

career and was a four-time All-SEC selection. Collantes was also named the 1993 Mississippi Female Amateur Athlete of the Year.

Collantes participated in the NCAAs all four years of her career, advancing to the quarterfinals her junior year and the Final Four her senior year.

Also during her senior year, Collantes defeated the eventual NCAA Singles Champion, Angela Lettiere (6-4, 6-1) to capture the Rolex South Regional Singles title.

In December of 1992, Paloma achieved the distinction of being the first Ole Miss tennis player to ever be ranked No. 1 in the nation in singles by being selected No. 1 in the ITA National Women's Singles Rankings.

In 2000, Collantes became the first Ole Miss women's tennis player to be inducted into The University of Mississippi Athletic Hall of Fame.

Collantes resides in Miami and is a regional events director for Scratch Music Group.



PASCALE PIQUEMAL 1994

Pascale Piquemal enjoyed a fine career at Ole Miss both on the court and in the classroom. She participated in the NCAA Championships twice, teaming with Marie-Laure Bougnol to reach the semifinals in 1993 and the nationally-televised doubles finals in 1994. The duo advanced higher than any Rebel in the history of the program. Bougnol and Piquemal completed the year ranked ninth nationally.

A two-time All-SEC honoree, Piquemal posted a 63-39 singles record and 38-20 doubles mark in four years. Throughout her career, Piquemal had several impressive upset wins over nationally-ranked opponents, including defeating the nation's second ranked player in 1993, Kelly Pace of Texas, at the All-American Championships.

Piquemal earned All-SEC Academic honors three years and was a member of the Chancellor's Honor Roll. She graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Engineering (computer science). For her outstanding accomplishments on the court, in the classroom and her involvement in the community, Piquemal was awarded the "Winning For Life" Scholarship sponsored jointly by Entergy Corporation and the NCAA Foundation. The "Winning For Life" program honors the top male and female scholarathletes for each state, and from there, the top male and female student-athlete from Louisiana, Mississippi, Arkansas and Southeast Texas. Piquemal received a \$2,000 post-graduate scholarship and used it to attend graduate school in France where she completed her master's degree in Business Administration.



MARIE-LAURE BOUGNOL 1993, 1994, 1996

Marie-Laure Bougnol enjoyed success at Ole Miss both on the court and off the court. The native of Marseille, France, earned All-America honors three times in four years. Bougnol advanced to the NCAA Championship in each of her four years, most notably teaming with Pascale Piquemal to reach the doubles semifinals her freshman year and the nationally-televised doubles final in her sophomore season.

She was in the national rankings every year in both singles and doubles and steadily climbed into the top 15. As a freshman, Bougnol earned ITA South Region Rookie of the Year honors.

In 1993, Bougnol won her first grand slam title by capturing the SkyTel National Clay Court Championships in Jackson, Miss. She reached the finals again in 1994.

A three-time All-Southeastern Conference selection, Bougnol also reached the semifinals of the Rolex South Regional Championships twice and won the 1992 SEC Fall Coaches' Classic, giving her the title of SEC Individual Champion for the season.

Twice, Bougnol received the ITA Tennis Match Magazine Rolex South Region Arthur Ashe Jr. Sportsmanship and Leadership Award and was a finalist for the national award in 1995. Her senior year, Bougnol was the recipient of the Eugenia Conner Award for the Most Outstanding Female Student-Athlete at the University of Mississippi. She was the first tennis player to receive this award. Bougnol has also been a star in the classroom, being named to the All-SEC Academic team three times and the Dean's Honor Roll and the Chancellor's Honor Roll. In 1996 she was named to the GTE/CoSIDA District VI Academic All-America Team for her academic accomplishments, and Bougnol received an NCAA \$5,000 post-graduate scholarship.

Bougnol completed her doctoral degree at the University of Mississippi and became the second Rebel women's tennis player to be inducted into the Ole Miss Athletic Hall of Fame, joining in 2003.

She currently works at Jacksonville University as an Assistant Professor for Management.



COURTENAY CHAPMAN 1996, 1997, 1998

Courtenay Chapman became the first Lady Rebel to win 100 singles and doubles matches in a career her senior year in 1999. Chapman finished with 114 singles wins and 102 doubles victories. She earned All-SEC first team honors in doubles and participated in the NCAA Individual Championships for the fourth year in a row. A three-time All-American, Chapman was named the Southeastern Conference Tournament

MVP after helping the Rebels capture their first-ever SEC Tournament Championship. Chapman ended the 1998 year ranked 10th in doubles with Agnes Muzamel and participated in the NCAA Individual Championships.. She helped the Rebels reach the quarterfinals at the NCAA Team Championships.

In 1997, Chapman helped the Rebels win the NCAA Central Region Championships and advance to the NCAA Team Championships. She reached the quarterfinals of the NCAA Doubles Championship with Muzamel and captured the Rolex South Regional Doubles title. Chapman earned All-SEC honors.

Chapman burst onto the scene as a freshman in 1996 and made a major contribution to the Rebels' success. She completed the year ranked 89th in singles and seventh in doubles. Chapman, a native of Jackson, Miss., participated in the NCAA Individual Championships in doubles with Marie-Laure Bougnol. Chapman posted a 35-13 overall record, which included an 18-7 mark at the No. 3 position. She was named the ITA South Region Rookie-of-the-Year. She teamed with Bougnol to reach the semifinals of the Clay Courts and the All-American Championships. In addition, Chapman was selected as one of three Clarion-Ledger Female Athletes of the Year in Mississippi and was named Mississippi's top female tennis player in 1995.

ALL-AMERICANS



AGNES MUZAMEL 1996, 1997, 1998, 1999

Agnes Muzamel was one of the best to ever lace up the shoes for Ole Miss, becoming just the second Rebel to earn All-America honors all four years. She led the Rebels to their first-ever SEC Tournament Championship, the NCAA quarterfinals, and a final national ranking of No. 6. Muzamel earned All-SEC honors for the fourth year in a row and ended the year ranked No. 8 in the nation in singles. She finished her career with 122 wins, second all-time at

Ole Miss.

Muzamel led the Rebels to the quarterfinals at the NCAA Team Championships in 1998. An NCAA singles and doubles participant, Muzamel ended the year ranked 13th in singles and 10th in doubles. She was selected to the All-SEC team. Muzamel was a finalist at the National Clay Court Championships and a quarterfinalist at the All-American Championships. In addition, she captured the Rolex South Regional singles and doubles titles.

Muzamel enjoyed an outstanding sophomore campaign in 1997, ending the season ranked No. 2 in singles and No. 3 in doubles. She was the only player to be ranked top five in singles and doubles. Muzamel posted a final record of 43-12 and advanced to the NCAA Quarterfinals in singles and doubles. She earned All-SEC honors in singles and doubles and was named to the Rolex Collegiate All-Star Team.

Muzamel was a huge contributor to the Rebels' success in 1996, while playing at the No. 2 spot. She ended the year ranked 26th in singles and defeated seven nationally-ranked players, including three who were ranked in the top 20 at the time of the match. She reached the round of 16 at the NCAA Championships. Additional honors included being named ITA/Penn South Region Player-to-Watch and selected to the All-SEC second team. Muzamel posted a 24-6 record, including a 12-match winning streak during the season.

In 2009, Muzamel became the third women's tennis player to be inducted into the Ole Miss Athletics Hall of Fame.



MIRA RADU 2002, 2003

Mira Radu placed her name among the finest in women's tennis history, earning All-America honors her last two years. She became just the fourth Rebel to record 100 wins, finishing with a 108-52 career mark.

In 2003, Radu enjoyed one of the finest seasons in the history of the program. Named the NCAA Woman of the Year for the state of Mississippi, Radu

advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Singles Championships and finished ranked No. 18 in the nation. She earned All-America honors for the second time, becoming the fifth Rebel to earn the distinction multiple times. Radu posted a 24-11 overall record and went 8-3 in the SEC on her way to earning All-SEC honors for the second consecutive year.

Radu received the ITA South Region Cissie Leary Sportsmanship Award and was a co-recipient of the Eugenia Conner Memorial Award for the most outstanding female athlete on campus.

Radu became the sixth All-American in the history of the program in 2002. She led the Rebels to their seventh consecutive NCAA appearance and led the team with a 33-16 overall record. Radu posted a 14-8 record at No. 1 singles and ended the year ranked No. 20 in the nation. In addition she earned All-SEC honors for the first time in her career. Radu qualified for the NCAA Singles Championships and posted her best overall record since a 35-12 mark her freshman campaign.

Off the court, Radu was named an ITA Scholar-Athlete and selected to the Verizon/CoSIDA District VI Academic All-America second team. She also made the SEC Academic Honor Roll three times and was a member of the Chancellor's, Dean's and UMAA Honor Rolls.

Radu graduated cum laude with a bachelor's degree in business administration

from the University of Mississippi in 2003 and magna cum laude with a master of arts in Spanish from Ole Miss in 2005. She earned her Master's in business administration from the University of Memphis in August 2010 and received a Master's degree in sports psychology from the University of Iowa in May 2011.

Radu currently works as a tennis pro at College Park Athletic Club in Chicago.



CHLOE CARLOTTI

Chloe Carlotti stamped her name on the Ole Miss program in two years, becoming an All-American in 2005. By earning All-America honors her senior year, Carlotti joined an elite group of NCAA Division I players to earn All-America honors at more than one school, also accomplishing the feat at Fresno State.

In 2005, Carlotti posted a 24-13 overall record, 15-8 at No. 1 singles in leading the Rebels to

their first ever SEC Western Division Championship and their 11th NCAA appearance. The Rebels ended the year ranked No. 37. Carlotti reached the round of 16 at the NCAA Singles Championships and ended the year ranked No. 31 in the nation. She came within one win of reaching 100 for her career, finishing at 99-45. In addition, Carlotti earned All-SEC honors by going 8-3 in the SEC at No. 1 doubles with Virginia Tomatis. The pair qualified for the NCAA Doubles Championships and finished the year ranked No. 28 in the nation.

During her first season (2004) with the Rebels, Carlotti was named to the All-SEC team and participated in the NCAA Championships in singles and doubles. Carlotti ended the year ranked No. 65 in singles and No. 34 in doubles.

Off the court, Carlotti was named an ITA Scholar-Athlete in 2005 and made the SEC Academic Honor Roll. Carlotti was a regular on the Dean's Honor Roll and turned in a perfect 4.0 grade point average in the spring of 2005.

Carlotti received her degree in Marketing at Ole Miss.



KRISTI BOXX 2010, 2012

Kristi Boxx ended an outstanding career in 2012 becoming the second Rebel to amass 200 wins combined in singles and doubles. She earned All-America honors for the second time in both singles and doubles, ending the year ranked No. 17 in singles and No. 6 in doubles. The Grenada, Miss., native earned top-10 finishes in doubles with two different partners during her career. In addition, Boxx became the second player to earn All-SEC first team

honors all four years of her career.

In 2010, Boxx became the eighth All-American in the history of the program. She was one of only nine players to earn the honor in both singles and doubles.

Boxx ended the year ranked No. 30 in the nation in singles and No. 10 in doubles. She advanced to the round of 16 at the NCAA Singles Championship and also participated in the NCAA Doubles Championship with Karen Nijssen. Boxx Earned All-SEC first team honors for the second year in a row and was named to the first ever SEC All-Tournament Team ...

In one of their best seasons in several years, Boxx helped the Rebels advance to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen for the eighth time, capture the SEC Western Division Championship and earn a final national ranking of No. 17. She helped the team post its best overall conference finish (2nd) since 1999 and its best league record (8-3) since 2000 Other individual honors included being named the ITA Southern Player to Watch.

As a freshman, Boxx helped lead the Rebels back to the NCAA Tournament and a season-ending ranking of No. 21. She ended the year ranked No. 37 in the nation in singles and No. 12 in doubles. Boxx earned All-SEC first team honors while playing No. 1 singles and doubles all season and was named to the SEC All-Freshman Team. She qualified for the NCAA Championships in singles and doubles.

Boxx graduated from the University of Mississippi in May of 2012. She resides in Oxford, where she works and teaches tennis.



KAREN NIJSSEN 2010

Karen Nijssen became the ninth All-American in the history of the program, earning the honor in doubles with Kristi Boxx.

Nijssen was a huge part of the Rebels' success during her three-year career.

In one of their best seasons in several years, Nijssen helped the Rebels advance to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen for the eighth time, capture the SEC

Western Division Championship and earn a final national ranking of No. 17. She helped the team post its best overall conference finish (2nd) since 1999 and its best league record (8-3) since 2000.

Nijssen was a three-time All-SEC honoree and an NCAA Doubles participant three times with two different partners. She ended every year of her career nationally ranked in doubles including No. 10 in 2010 with Boxx.

Off the court, Nijssen was a member of the SEC Academic Honor Roll and a regular on the University Honor Roll.

Nijssen, who graduated in May of 2011, currently works at Just Brands in Holland.



ABBY GUTHRIE

Abby Guthrie became the 10th All-American in the histor of the program in 2012 ending the year ranked No. 6 in the nation in doubles. Guthrie ended the year ranked No. 6 in the nation in doubles. She finished ranked No. 1 in the Southern Region in doubles and No. 15 in singles. Guthrie helped lead the Rebels to their fourth consecutive NCAA appearance and a host site for the NCAA first and second rounds. In addition, she helped lead the Rebels to

their second top-four overall SEC finish in three years and third SEC Tournament Semifinal appearance in four years. Individually, Guthrie made the SEC All-Tournament Team. She finished a combined 20-2 in the SEC at No. 1 doubles and No. 5 singles.

During her career, Guthrie helped lead the Rebels to four straight NCAA appearances, including the Sweet Sixteen in 2010 as well as the SEC Western Division Championship in 2010. She particiapted in the NCAA Doubles Championships twice.

Off the court, Guthrie was named an ITA Scholar-Athlete, selected to the SEC Academic Honor Roll and a regular on the University Honor Roll.

Guthrie graduated from the University of Mississippi in 2013.



JULIA JONES 2015

Julia Jones became the 11th All-American in the history of the program in 2015. As a senior, she helped lead the Rebels to their seventh consecutive NCAA appearance and helped Ole Miss rank inside the top 25 all season. Jones finished the year ranked No. 10 in the nation in singles and No. 65 in doubles. She was seeded 9-16 in the NCAA Singles Championship.

Additional honors included being named

to the All-SEC First Team, the ITA National Most Improved Player of the Year and the ITA Southern Region Senior of the Year. Jones became the seventh player in program history to record 100 wins in her career. In the fall of 2014, Jones captured the USTA/ITA Southern Regional singles title.

Jones was a huge part of the Rebels' success during her four-year career, earning All-SEC honors three times and helping Ole Miss earn an NCAA berth all four years.

Off the court, Jones was an outstanding student-athlete, earning ITA Scholar-Athlete honors and SEC Academic Honor Roll status all four years. She graduated with honors from the University of Mississippi in May of 2015 with a degree in accountancy.

Jones served as a volunteer assistant coach for the Rebels during the 2018 season, helping guide them to their highest ranking in program history at No. 3 in February. and finishing the year at No. 8.





ARIANNE HARTONO 2016, 2018

Arianne Hartono became the 12th All-American in the history of the program in 2016, and followed that up with the school's first ever NCAA Championship in women's singles in 2018.

In 2017, Hartono helped lead the Rebels to their ninth straight NCAA appearance and earned All-SEC first team honors. She ended the year ranked No. 32 in singles and No. 25 in doubles.

Hartono advanced to the round of 16 at the

NCAA Singles Championship in 2016 on her way to earning All-America honors, and also participated in the NCAA Doubles Championship. She ended the year ranked No. 26 in the nation in singles and No. 32 in doubles. In addition, Hartono earned All-SEC second team honors and finished with a team-leading 22-14 overall record, 13-7 at No. 1 singles. She teamed with Mai El Kamash for a 10-8 record at No. 1 doubles. Hartono posted 10 nationally-ranked wins in singles.

In 2018, Hartono was named SEC Player of the Year and guided the Rebels to a No. 8 final ranking, their highest for the program since 1999 after reaching as high as No. 3 during the season. Seeded sixth, Hartono cruised through the first three rounds of play, taking them in straight sets, before needing three sets in the quarter and semifinals before downing Pepperdine's Ashley Lahey 6-4, 6-2 to win the program's first NCAA title.

Hartono also earned All-American honors in doubles, teaming up with partner Alexa Bortles, becoming the third player in program history to earn the honor in both mediums in the same

season. The duo finished the season ranked No. 7 in the country and were also given All-SEC honors.

Hartono was a four-time ITA Scholar-Athlete and four-time member of the SEC Academic Honor Roll. She is currently training in her native Netherlands and competing on the international circuit.



ALEXA BORTLES

Teaming up with eventual NCAA National Champion and two-time All-American Arianne Hartono, Bortles earned All-American honors in doubles after earning a 5-8 seed in the NCAA Individual Championships.

The pair reached the Round of 16 after grinding out a 7-6 (4), 6-0 victory over Fresno State. The pair fell to eventual National Champions (LSU's Eden Richardson and Jessica Golovin) in the Sweet Sixteen

after a grueling tiebreaker.

Bortles and Hartono finished the season ranked No. 7, earning All-SEC honors. The pair went 23-13 and 11-7 versus nationally ranked competition.
