Sunday, Jan. 6, 1918.

My dearest Mother,

My last letter ^{was} written the
1st but this is my first op-
portunity to write to you since
that time. I am getting along
fine and like my new assign-
ment. I am under a fine
Captain but I have lots of
experiences to learn before
I become as efficient as

I should be. The more I go
to these army schools the
less I seem to know. It
is the greatest study in
the world and it takes
years and years to make
a good officer. It is a
hard undertaking to
break in on a new
organization and begin
active duties at once.
These problems that make

a man almost sweat blood will
someday be the making of him.
Mother, I long to be back home
with you all. To-morrow I am
executive for my battery and
have a thousand things to think
about.

I have heard nothing from
you for about ~~four~~^{three} weeks
and hope to have some mail
soon. I have two friends rooming
with me. Kelly who was my room-
mate before and another friend
from ^{austin,} Texas whom I have
known before. Lt. H. D. Mc Crummer.
We have just gotten located
in officers quarters to-day. Neither
one of them are in my Battery.
This afternoon I took a bunch

the range and hauled
in a gun and caisson.
I like the organization
here and with all
my might I am trying
to make good. Of all the
the courses that I have
had this is the hardest

and I never felt greener
before in all my life.

Mother, I love you and
father and think of
you both all the time.

Joe and Rivers.
