My dearest Mother,

A few minutes ago I received your letter of Nov. 29th and the muffler. Mother,

I thank you a thousand times for the muffler and I appreciate the numbers of stitches and the time spent in making it. If you only knew how much

pleasure and joy down in
my heart then you would
know more about how glad
that I was to receive it.

I am glad you put the
card inside. Else I would
not have known who
sent it as the wrapping
was nearly all gone but
the muffer did not receive
a scratch.

I also received a letter from
"Pete" telling me that Uncle Will's
bin had burned. Yesterday I
had a fine letter from Aunt
Mattie. It has been hard to write
for the last few days as we
have been working so hard.
Then I am now and have
to make preparations before going
out to instruct the Battery. Every
organization has a way all
of its own and you have
to change your ideas to meet
the situation. Then I have had
so much of the Theoretical

instruction, which does
not suit these old Regulars
who have been in the
game so long, I like
my Captain and my
Battery also. I hope I
will remain with
them and it seems as
if my assignment is
permanent.

My battery was formed
in Chicago ~~tw~~ in 1915 and
they are a fine class
of men who before this
war started you could
