quite a while.

The four from my Battery have
been in same places since
leaving camp until to-day when
Joe Daugherty left us. But he is in
a different regiment from us.
He was a very smart man but
his yankee ways were tiresome
and we have not been to-
gether much of late. But Monk,
Kelly and I are almost always
to-gether. Kelly still is one of my
Bunkies and then the other is
a Texas man with one of the big-
gest hearts in the world and I
find that he knows Miss ^(Capt.) Effie
Greaves from Austin, Texas, as
he lives there. His name is

Hugh D. Mc Crummer. I saw
some wonderful firing this
a.m. and can say that
the americans make expert
gunners. I love my work
but it is the hardest
thing that I have ever
undertaken to do. Then too
I miss the home life
especially the Sunday
School. I have ^{not} been in

quite a while.

let me know if Sister is
at home or at school. My
last from you was the
17th of December but some
of the men have received
