Feb 10th 1918.

My dearest Mother,

Your letter of Jan 7th received yesterday and only the day before your Xmas card and a long letter from Sister came. Your letter and card immensely enjoyed. Many sentimental expressions of a Mother's love were clearly understood. Sister's letter was full of news about the many wedding especially, as Margaret Brown and Agnes Gray and such of the younger class as Ray Coats, all news interests me very much.

A few minutes ago one of my room-mates "Kell" had orders to leave to-morrow. But I guess he will be back with me soon. But no change for me to-night although my locker is

packed and ready. I was especially glad to hear that Gary had joined some branch of the service. I felt sure he had the proper patriotism. I had a letter from Haubelt and Luther yesterday and Haubelt has received his commission as 1st Lt. in aviation. That is certainly fine.

A funny coincidence, I heard from Haubelt and Luther in same mail the 1st time then I wrote to them in same mail and yesterday I rec'd their 2nd letters in same mail.

I was glad to get Mike's address and will write to him soon. I will be on the look out for the fruit cake that Aunt Jennie sent me. I never hear any thing about the business at home and would like to have some mail from Dad. I never will forget the

many nice letters that he
wrote me while at Fort Logan A. Roots.

We wear steel helmets all
the time and it is also a
new worry above the brain but
have become accustomed to it.

Mother, I have your picture in
my pocket. It is going to be kept
along with me. I will answer sister's
letter soon. Give my love to each and
all of my friends and loved ones.
