The requisition-count sheet form, replacing the branch stock books and the inter-store requisition, designed for the SIM system is so efficient and carries so much more information than the inter-store transfer, that every buyer in this division wishes to adopt this form. Unfortunately, this is not possible for wide acceptance since the warehouse sequence stocking of reserves is not coordinated with the item listing on the requisition-count sheet requisition."

Development effort is being continued to further refine SIM and add more sophisticated OR techniques to its design. In addition, consideration is being given to the eventual adaptation of the system to electronic data processing equipment.
