Cedar Oaks Treasure: Preserving Cedar Oaks

After more than 160 years, our lovely house needs some TLC. Work has begun to repair and paint the exterior of Cedar Oaks! Last fall Kate Kenwright, Historic Preservationist for Oxford, secured a grant for \$20,000 from the Mississippi Hills Heritage Area Alliance, to be matched by the city. The mission of the organization, which covers essentially the northeast quarter of the state, is "to preserve, enhance, interpret and promote the cultural and heritage assets of the region in a manner that enhances exposure, education and economic growth." https://mississippihills.org/

Obtaining historical approval and bids took some time, but hopefully the work will be completed soon. The worker from Greene Construction who was removing rotten wood said he expected to finish this week. When it is repaired, painters will finish the job. I happened to stop by Cedar Oaks on Tuesday for another reason, and was able to see the work in progress.
