I am getting along fine to-day. The sunshine is beautiful and the springtime is wonderful with every thing around highly colored with artistic colors and tints. It is really a marvelous springtime, but it is because we are having a few days to rest in comfort. Oh, it would be good to forget about the war. Then too you may think I was wrong to turn down a chance to come home as an instructor but Mother I wanted to see more service and I know I can be of more use over here than at home. The French are a great nation and a lovable people to be with and I ~~love~~^{like} the French officers I have been with very much. About seven days ago I mailed to ~~you~~^{Daddy} a shell case which I had decorated. It is the sign of
