AFFAIRS OF STATE

THE RECORD

A few days ago, we published a letter written by a Negro, in which he asked that he be not saved from the South. So many have called to ask about Joseph F. Albright, now residing in Jackson, that we have asked the State Sovereignty Commission to get us his record. Here it is:

Albright is one of the nation's outstanding Negro patriots. During his 40 years of public service in government and industry, he had earned an enviable reputation as an uncompromising American.

He is the "arch foe" of Communism, having been engaged in the exposure of the duplicity and dangers of this godless philosophy for many years. He has publicly attacked the Communist party all over America, demanding that it be legally abolished.

He served in military intelligence in the Air Force during World War II, reporting directly to the office of the Commanding General, the late "Hap" Arnold. He was decorated with the Commendation Ribbon and was awarded a "superior" rating upon being given his honorable discharge. In addition, he was given commendation by the White House for his outstanding efforts in building war morale among civilians and the military forces.

Albright served for six years as the Special Assistant to the Administrator of Veterans Affairs (Veterans Administration), appointed by General of the Army, Omar N. Bradley. In this capacity he addressed 39 national and 346 local organizations in behalf of veter-

ans and their dependents.

He has spoken to more than 2 million students. . . secondary and collegiate. . . in every section of the country. In 1955 he was the official guest of the Department of Education of the State of Mississippi, lecturing in Negro high schools and colleges. So impressive was this service that he was again invited to return to the state for additional lectures. In each instance his itinerary was arranged by Dr. J. M. Tubb, Superintendent of Education. Recently, since returning to Mississippi to establish permanent residence in Jackson, he was the convocation speaker at Jackson State College before the summer school. He is widely known and highly respected throughout the state. With his wide acquaintance throughout the nation, he has contact with virtually every major Negro organization and personal knowledge of their leaders. Few Negroes alive have any greater knowledge of Negro affairs.

By profession he is a public relations consultant and journalist. He is co-founder and past president of the National Association of Market Developers, an organization of top flight Negro sales promotion personnel who are employed by industries whose net worth is more than 100 billion dollars.

Angered at the Communist inspired efforts of outside of the state agitators to disrupt the peaceful relationships between the races, he has been utilizing his long experience in espionage and intelligence. . . and his far flung contacts. . . to wage relentless war upon these disruptive and subversive agitators.
