#### THIS WEEK in MISSISSIPPI LITERARY HISTORY

The following events all happened during this week in Mississippi history.

#### Year:

1928: Columnist and teacher Ewilda Fancher was born in Houston, Mississippi. (Aug. 22)

1930: Theologian Harmon L. Smith was born in Ellisville, Mississippi. (Aug. 23)

**1931:** Baptist minister and broadcaster **Nelson Lynn Price** was born in Osyka, Mississippi. (Aug. 24)

1935: Educator Anne H. Adams was born in Hamilton, Mississippi. (Aug. 25)

**1939:** Fiction writer Lewis Nordan was born in Jackson, Mississippi. (Aug. 23)

**1939:** Political scientist **Harold R. Rodgers**, **Jr.**, was born in Columbus, Mississippi. (Aug. 25)

**1942:** Medical doctor and writer **John M. Smith** was born in Laurel, Mississippi. (Aug. 23)

**1944:** Medical writer **Donald M. Vickery** was born in Brookhaven, Mississippi. (Aug. 22)

**1944:** Murry Falkner, brother of William and John Faulkner, married Suzanne Coqterre. (Aug. 24)

**1949:** Historian **Thomas D. Cockrell** was born in Mississippi. (Aug. 26)

1960: William Faulkner accepted an appointment to the University of Virginia faculty. (Aug. 25)

**1973:** Flags in the Dust, an uncut version of the novel Sartoris by William Faulkner, was published for the first time by Random House, more than 40 years after the original novel was published. (Aug. 22)

1977: Singer and writer <u>Jimmy Buffett</u> married his second wife, Jane Slagsvol. (Aug. 27)

**1982:** Historian George C. Osborn died. (Aug. 23)

**1989:** The opera *Pamelia*, libretto by **Linda Peavy** and Ursula Smith, was first performed in Billings, Montana. (Aug. 25)

**1992:** Spanish professor **Reginald C. Reindorp** died in Purvis, Mississippi. (Aug. 27)

**1998:** Country comedian <u>Jerry Clower</u> died in Jackson, Mississippi, five days after undergoing heart bypass surgery. (Aug. 24)

#### **Description from** *Publishers Weekly* :

Hoar makes a crackling debut (after the story collection *Body Parts*) with this Southern noir thriller about a decorated Vietnam vet up to no good in Mississippi. Luke Carr is locked away on the psychiatric ward of a VA hospital in the deep South. The diagnosis is post-traumatic stress disorder. The therapy consists of a series of notebooks in which Luke is supposed to tell his story "using colored pencils—pastels when I am unsure, darker colors for certainties." Through these notebooks, Luke records his post-Vietnam downfall, as the bookish, sensitive vet becomes a gun for hire.

After returning home from his three tours in Southeast Asia, the solitary, disturbed Luke plots to steal art from Tom Morris, a wealthy businessman and collector. Along the way he encounters Morris's wife, Kinnerly, the former love of his life. Predictably, they resume the affair they'd ended years ago as students at Ole Miss. Within six weeks, the scheming Kinnerly has Luke convinced that offing her husband is the only decent thing to do. But soon another local rich guy, Jeff Ballard, also offers Luke a handsome payment for a hit on Tom. Luke discovers that Jeff and Kinnerly have recently been lovers and suspects something fishy, but agrees to take the job anyway. The hit goes awry when a local farmer catches Luke red-handed and blackmails him. Soon, Luke has to kill him, too. Seduction, betrayal, revenge and surprises lurk around the corner as the lovers plot their getaway. The plot makes rapid switchback turns all the way to the last page.
