In 1963, Mississippi Civil Rights activist Medgar Evers was shot to death outside his home in Jackson, Mississippi. The accused killer, white supremacist Byron De La Beckwith, was brought to

trial twice for the murder but both times was released because of hung juries. This new film, directed by Rob Reiner and starring Alec Baldwin, Whoopi Goldberg, James Woods, and Craig T.
