At this time I would like to offer my CHRISTIAN LOVE to suggest to you if you like to leave the country and accept my suggestion to be at the American University in Beirut, Lebanon. or at the University of Cairo which is soley under the Americans Administration and I knew the president also president Nasser of the United Arab Republic who the latter will be delighted to help solve this problem which is no headache at all in the United Arab Republic neither in Lebanch where colored people and the white people are living much peacefully and intergrated than we are in the United States.

The U.S. Federal government can force order on the people only but it can't change the minds of the people where hates and anger could piled up tremendously and may cost the State of Mississippi its freedom if the Federal government has to move in again to restore order and safe guard lives and property of the people.

In Cairo you will be in an interdenominational and intergrated University the world's over and I'm sure president McClean will be happy to have you also you will have chance to study Arabic and the cultural life of the Middle East which our most beloved the most immortal Licoln has spoken of and put down in our Constitution to go by it and practice it and it seems that the 1860 argument to free men from the bandage of the slavery supremacy of the white men specially the selfish ones is back again and could leads to blood know how to avoid it.
