My dearest Mother,

I am getting along
fine. But I certainly
would like to be up in

the American drive that
has started wonderfully
well. The Americans are
at last started and they
have started off strong.

This St. Michel salient is
of great importance and
the Germans have had
it for four years during
that time no one has

been able to take it from
them. The papers are
filled with glowing
accounts of praise
for the Americans.

I went in to the city last night and had a wonderful fine dinner at the "Chapou Fin" with Capts Bloom, Beard, Hoover and Leonard. They are a fine bunch of Capts and we had a meal worth while. After dinner we went to a French Show where many American melodies were sung between acts. I finished with another bunch yesterday and start out again to-morrow.

The old bunch that I
was with in training
camp will be in camp
here for training in the
next two or three weeks.

I have seen Major. Rod.
Dayle several times. He
was in same battery
with me. My friend

Major Norton said, "Lt. Adams would you like to know who that is out there saddling your horse?" And it was "Babe" Adams the famous Pittsburg base ball pitcher that won the world series, I think in 1910 or 1911. He is a corporal in the 135th F.A. that I was instructing last week.

Mother, I wish you would ~~take in the~~ send me about 20 of my visiting cards which were left in the top dresser drawer in my room. I often
