My dearest Mother,

I have received one letter
at three different periods to-day
which is a very nice way
to get mail. The first was
your letter of Sept 29th in-
cluding the letter from
Dudley. The letter telling
me that Dudley was back
in the states was quite

a surprise to me although
he wrote me some months
ago that he might be
sent back at any time
as an instructor.

The second letter to-day
was from my "old Captain"
at the front telling me
the changes ^{that have} taken place
in the regiment lately. He
is now Battalion Commander
and Fred Waters has the
battery. I would have given

almost any thing to have remained with them during the time that I have been down here. Mother, this Capt. Robbins was one of the finest men that I have ever known.

The third letter to-day was from the dearest person in the world, and from the same as my first letter, and that is my Mother. It is certainly very alarming that the "flu" is causing so much sickness and quite a few deaths. It has not spread very bad over here. Although there are a few ^{bad} cases.

I did not know that Percy Crawley, Sid Sessions or Frank Robinson
