had arrived while I
was away. They were
enjoyed and will be
over and over again. In

of the visiting cards

but I managed to see
my locker on this trip and
found some in it so
I ~~was~~ won't need any more
soon.

I had my baggage shipped
down here so I hope to
have most of it with me
soon. It will be a source
of great pleasure to have
my locker trunk with me
again. For it has so
many little memories of
home in it. For instance, pictures
and small luxuries.

On my trip I visited
Paris and was there
a couple of days with
Ralph Kelly and Fred
Anderson who were on

their way home. It was
great to see some of
the boys from the
regiment again. They

were ordered home to-
gether with Monk and
Bradford whom I
failed to see on road
to organize a new

be mustered out soon
after they get back
to the old "States" again.
