Nov. 29th 1918.

My dearest Mother,

Yesterday was a wonderful Thanksgiving day for all of us. There were so many things happening that I did not get to write you a Thanksgiving letter.

I arose for breakfast at 7 am. and imm-

immediately after, came
over to the office to
attend to the daily office
work.

There were two firing
instruments loaned
to another school of
about 40 miles away
so at nine a.m. I
started out in a
Dodge Sedan to get

them. I only had the
chauffer and my room-
mate along. It was
a beautiful drive on
good gravel roads and
in a nice fall shower.
Our turkey banquet was
~~not~~ scheduled for 2 o'clock
so we just had good
time to make the trip.

I found what I went
after and saw my
friend Capt. A. D. Smith
for about 20 minutes. The
dinner was splendid,

we had fine music
and songs. Every
one thoroughly enjoyed
the whole affair.
