My dearest Mother,

I have a few minutes while awaiting my train so will write you a letter. It is the last day of 1918 and I hope to reach my out-fit to-day or to-night. It was one year ago to-day when I first joined them at Cretzuidan. So here is hoping that I have good luck in getting to them to-night. The German trains are very good and make better time than the French trains.

I had a very good billet last night in a German Hotel. Also a very good breakfast and noon meal to-day. The German officers and soldiers salute and none of them act offensive at all. Capt. Howe and I will part company at three o'clock this afternoon as we go to different places. We have

had a very pleasant trip to-gether.
Lt. Hand left ^{us} at another place yesterday
for his out-fit.

I saw my old Colonel of the
regiment a few days ago and he
said that he would be back with
us soon. I wish I could be home
for the New Year to-morrow but
am really glad to have had this
chance to see Germany as well as
France. Every thing is very quiet
and peaceable.

Write me soon as it almost
a month since I have heard from
you. Lots of love to all.
