My dear Mother,

I have just finished a letter to Hamblet. He is in 85th Aero. Squadron at Toul, France. In his letter he had high hopes of returning to the "states" soon.

Kelley came last night and we had a nice chat. He was sent away on manoeuvres this morning with the 165th (New York) Inf.

I am very comfortably located now. The room is full of books and at night when I come in I enjoy reading them very much. The books belong to the Chaplain of the regiment. He is about the busiest man in the reg't. Last week the Col. sent him around to Base Hospital to visit the men that were sick and find out when they would re-join the ~~hospital~~ regiment.

The 151st F.A. is shooting up the hill about $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile from here and it sounds

like the war is on
again. We have a bunch
of ammunition issued
and will fire next week.
We want to be in good
practice for the next war.

Did Harry Moore get
his discharge? I suppose
he has by this time. I
don't see what they
are holding the men
at Park Field for. We
have plenty left over here
yet so they had better
make a bit of room
for us. We will be
rolling in soon.

Mother, I want to say, that
I recognize the glorious way
in which you have done
your duty, with straight pressing
on, never letting me see
the effort, in your cheering
and helpful letters. Yet, they
are full of motherly love
from start to finish. I want
to make you really happy
when I come home and
just remember that you and
Lucia will come first with
me. Love to Dad, and the
boys.
