On The first and most important occasion the whole \$2 division was inspected and reviewed in Remagen on Sunday, Mar, 16. Remagen is a vice little town on the River Rhing where

the scenery is very beautiful. Just accross the river were the foot-hills of the Eiffel Mountains. This Khine Valley scenery is said to be the most beautiful in the world. Every foot of ground seems to be tilled, even down to The river banks.
