My dearest Mother,
I am getting along
fine now. Mother, if I
hadn't come to the hospital
when I did there I never
would have pulled through
I had a hard case of
"flu" with a touch of pneumonia.
My captain, Fred Watters,
and Lt. Col. Redden both
died from same cause
while I was in the
hospital here.

Mother, it was sad
for these two splendid
men to serve throughout
the struggle and then
pass away in Germany

attached to this life
here now. Home would
