My dearest Mother,

We are still here and
will be either until the
8th or 9th of Apr. I am
getting along fine. Fred
orders this morn to
report to Bat. a few
days. Maj. Robbins is try-
ing to get the order
changed so I am

waiting to see what
success he will have
before I change. It
is to late in the game
for changes now. If
I have to change then
I would rather go to
A. than to any other
battery.

I am O.T. to-
day. We have to
undergo a physical
exam this morning.

It is for the purpose
of determining whether
or not we should
come home.

It is hard to write
here with a bunch
talking to me all
the time. I will finish
this after dinner.

3 P.M. Same
day.

Dearest Mother,

Just after I stopped
writing this morning

we had the medical
inspection by 3 officers
from Adq. III Army
and found every man
in C. Bat. O.K.

This will probably
be the last letter from
Germany that I can
mail to you. The P.O.
will be discontinued at
7 A.M. to-morrow. We
leave here on the afternoon
of Apr. 8th. Only six

more days in Ringen.
 We have a long march
 to catch the train;
 as we board the
 train, in Oberwinter,
 from orders just rec'd.

Well, we are very
 happy. The men have
 just had a ^{hot} game
 of basket ball between
 3rd sections. The ^{4th} ~~winning~~
 10 to 8. It was a

hot work and I could
not go for either
side as both are in
my platoon.

Further, the order
sending me to A. Bat
has just been rescinded
and I get to stay
with E. much to my
joy. I would not have
mindd the change so
much if I could have

been changed several times
but now it is only
a short time until we
will be at home.

We should sail
some where around the
17th of this month.
I should be home
by the 1st of May
and out of the
army again.

Best wishes to
all until I can see

you. Bushels of love
to you, dearest Mother, of
mine.
