Barnett Sees Progress As Result Of New Laws

BILOXI - Gov. Ross Barnett predicted here Friday that barring unforseen events, Mississippi is headed for unprecedented progress within the next several years as a result of a favorable economic atmosphere created by the present legislature.

Speaking at the 19th annual convention of the Mississippi Trucking Assn., the chief executive said that continuance of the progressive attitude of the officials and the people of this state will guarantee industrial and agricultural development.

Barnett cited that within the past few years some 400 new industries have come into the state and there are as a result more than 100,000 new residents of Mississippi. Some 40,000 new jobs have been created.

The chief executive reminded that present industries are the best salesmen for Mississippi because they have found the state as favorable to industry as had been expected.

"We live up to our promises to industry and agriculture alike in this state," Barnett declared.

Barnett paid tribute to the trucking industry of the state, citing that "your industry serves every community in Mississippi efficiently and profitably for the people."
