

# Severe weather downs trees around state investigate



hunderstorms produced large hail and tornado warnings across parts of Mississippi on Tuesday, as officials warned that severe weather could threaten the state through the night and into the week. The National Weather Service is warning that much of Mississippi has a "significant" risk of tornadoes from sunset Tuesday to dawn Wednesday. Weather officials upgraded warnings in the afternoon, saying much of northern Mississippi had a moderate chance of tornadoes. A number of tornado warnings were posted, but no injuries and little damage had been reported by the evening. Some trees were reported down and a few buildings were damaged in eastern Rankin County and western Scott County after a tornado was spotted on the ground there, according to a sheriff's dispatcher and local media.

# **Police** burglaries over holiday

The Oxford Police Department is investigating six residential burglaries that occurred over Thanksgiving break. Four of the burglaries were on Old Taylor Road, one was on Martin Luther King Jr. Drive and one was on Anderson Road.

OPD Sgt. Ryan Winters said this tends to happen when students leave for break.

"It's mostly because people are out of town not locking their vehicles or houses up," Winters said. "People will leave their things out in plain view, and burglars will see that and take full advantage of that. It's just an easy target for them."

So far, no arrests have been made in any of the individual investigations.

Winters said he believes the burglaries are not related in any way and seem to have been done by different people.

The University Police Department reported one burglary on campus over the break but was not available for comment when asked about an investigation.

## Rebels Roll West to give back over spring break


"I thought it was a lot of fun," said Michael Mossing, associate professor of chemistry and biochemistry, who went in 2016.

Jennifer Stollman of the William Winter Institute for Racial Reconciliation will accompany students in March 2017.

The current committee for Rebels Roll West is composed of one full-time staff member, one faculty member, three graduate assistants and six undergraduate students.

Committee member Ashley Kerbel is the graduate communitv director.

According to Kerbel, more than 200 students applied last year; however, only 12 were chosen. For this trip, the committee leaders will use blind applications, scoring them based solely on question responses.

"We're going to be making sure we have a very diverse group,' Kerbel said. "We may have students who are very involved on campus, but maybe this is their first involvement. We want to make sure we have a lot of blend and balance of students who are going."

Department of Student Housing Assistant Director for Marketing Jennifer McClure said, "We want students who are committed to not only the fun part, but more importantly the service component of it, too. We want them to have this as a networking and friendship-building opportunity as well. Maybe to connect with students they didn't already know who are on campus."

According to McClure, student housing has a student development fund to offer students educational and service opportunities. Rebels Roll West qualifies as one of those. Last year, the department used \$17,500 for the

## 15 years later: An Oxonian remembers 9/11

In 2001, while sipping a fresh cup of coffee and watching "Squawk Box" on CNBC, Gray Edmondson was shocked to hear a news anchor say a plane had just hit the World Trade Center in New York City near his home.

Now, Edmondson is a practicing attorney with Barnes Law Firm, P.A. in Oxford and lives with his wife Macey Edmondson, the dean of admissions at the Ole Miss School of Law, and their two sons. But he still remembers the day the towers went down.

On Sept. 11, 2001, 19 Al-Qaeda militants, an Islamic extremist group, overtook four airplanes and flew two into the World Trade Center's Twin Towers and one into The Pentagon. The remaining plane crashed in a Pennsylvania field.

Nearly 3,000 people were killed in New York City, Washington, D.C. and outside of Shanksville, Pennsylvania, according to CNN.

Edmondson, a recent Ole Miss graduate at the time, was studying tax law at New York University.

"When the plane first hit, even though it was a clear day, the assumption among most people around me was that it must have been a small private plane doing something stupid," Edmondson said. "Then, after the second plane hit and news came out about the Pentagon plane, it became clear that it was a terrorist attack."

Macey Edmondson was back home in Biloxi planning their wedding, when she received a call from him following the first plane

"I immediately called my wife, then fiancé, and told her what was going on and that I was going to walk to the World Trade Cenplane hit."

Chaos followed the second plane crash into the World Trade Center. Thick black smoke quickly engulfed crowds of people running, fearing for their life. Edmondson said this moment was extremely frightening.

"When the building first fell, everyone started screaming and running." Edmondson said. "While running, I could see over my shoulder what appeared to be a large amount of thick smoke overtaking people running as fast as they could."

Edmondson was relieved to find out that the "smoke" was actually ash. Inhalation of smoke could have caused Edmondson and others with him to die.

"I took off my shirt and breathed through it," Edmondson said. "The feeling that we could all be about to die from inhaling that much smoke was pretty scary."

Panic, confusion and fear swept through the lower Manhattan area following the two crashes. Blinded by the thickening ash. a pandemonium quickly spread throughout the rest of the city.

"The sound of jets flying what sounded like close overhead could be heard, but we could not see much of anything through the ash," Edmondson said. "People were screaming and jumping to the ground. It seemed as though

New York City could have been under attack with even more planes crashing to the ground."

Edmondson couldn't get in contact with his wife again until hours after the attacks. His home was completely closed off by officials because of its close proximity to the World Trade Center. This caused Edmondson to relocate to a friend's place for a few nights, and then a hotel for two weeks, until he was able to move back into his apartment.

Edmondson said the days after Sept. 11 were eerie. Lower Manhattan was a ghost town with no sign of human life.

"Walking in Lower Manhattan with no other people around, everything closed, smelling the burning building, seeing ash covered cars, seeing abandoned street vendor carts was very strange," Edmondson said. "When we got close to our building, we saw an army tank driving down the street."

Police and military officials strictly controlled the New York City area. They broke crowds down block by block, building by building.

"The whole scene looked like something out of an apocalypse movie," Edmondson said.

Edmondson said his building had yet to be confirmed that its structure was safe, so officials monitored it closely.





"The army only allowed three people in at the same time and gave them 15 minutes," Edmondson said. "I was given a flashlight and 15 minutes to run up 21 flights of stairs, pack my belongings and run back down 21 flights of stairs with whatever I had packed."

Edmondson couldn't reunite with his fiancée until Nov. 21, three days before their wedding.

Edmondson said the events he experienced that day were scary, but he currently does not believe his life was ever at risk.

"Those few events were the only times I thought I could be in a near death situation," Edmondson said. "However, in actuality, I do not think I was ever in any real danger."

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### Ross Bjork reaches out to fans, looks to future



Ole Miss Vice Chancellor of Intercollegiate Athletics Ross Bjork issues an open letter to the Ole Miss fan base regarding the football team, the NCAA investigation and more:

Dear Ole Miss Family.

Greetings from the Ole Miss campus. I wanted to personally reach out to the Ole Miss Family as quickly as possible after this past weekend. It's hard to believe the football season went by so fast and has now come to an end. With a new normal being established, it is also difficult to believe the Rebels will not be going to a fifth-straight bowl. Less than a year ago, Coach Freeze and our team were hoisting the AllState Sugar Bowl trophy in New Orleans. In 2014, the Landshark defense was No. 1 in the nation, allowing only 16 points per game. I could go on with recent accomplishments under Coach Freeze. but you know them already and that's what makes this season disappointing.

All of us who work for your athletics program embrace high expectations we signed up for this, and it is what makes Ole Miss a special place. We have all come to expect excellence, and that's a game changer for our culture and fanbase.

Make no mistake about it – not a single coach, staff member. student-athlete or administrator is content with the results of this season, and I assure you we will be relentless about getting back to the same trajectory of the previous four seasons. That plan and direction is built on a solid foundation that includes momentum across the entire University, enhanced athletic facilities, more financial resources than ever before, a confident fanbase and a commitment to excellence in all facets of our athletics program. None of those things are going away, and I can commit to you that we will not quit or let one season rattle our foundation. We are building a program to last.

So what's next? Here are a few areas we know you're interested in:

1.) Coaching Staff. As Coach Freeze has said, we will evaluate all aspects of the team and make appropriate changes. The search for a defensive coordinator is in full swing, and we have all of the resources to hire the best and brightest leader for our defense.

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### Ole Miss basketball ready for tough opposition

The Rebels look set to test their mettle over the coming weeks against a number of challenging teams. After a series of impressive wins, including one against reigning Atlantic 10 champion St. Joseph's, Ole Miss snapped back to reality with a loss in the Paradise Jam final against tenth ranked Creighton. Head coach Andrew Kennedy had no illusions about the loss.

"Creighton is just really good. They make more plays than us, they go 16 for 26 and they deserve to win the title over there." Kennedy said.

Three days after flying back from the tropical tournament based out of the U.S. Virgin Islands, the Rebels bounced back and posted a big 86-81 win against perennial Big Sky Conference powerhouse Montana. Led by University of New Mexico transfer Cullen Neal, who contributed 19 points and went five for eight from behind the ark, Ole Miss came out firing on all cylinders after competing with the Bluejays to the bitter

"I definitely think we had a good confidence level coming out of the Virgin Islands, I mean obviously it wasn't the result we wanted but I think we can feel good about losing a close game to a top 10 team in the country." Neal said.

Now, the Rebels look forward to a packed schedule with games against Middle Tennessee State, Memphis, Virginia

Tech and Murray State up next. The Ole Miss staff, led by Kennedy for their 11th consecutive year, understands both the difficulty and the reward from playing talented teams.

"They're gonna be tough, they're not going to give us anything free. It'll be a good challenge for our team, I think it'll be one that we need in order for us to continue to move the program forward." Kennedy said.

Deandre Burnett, who transferred in from Miami last season but was not eligible to play until this year, has stood out as a game changer for the Rebels all season. He currently holds the national record for points in a game this season with 41 during the Rebels' Paradise Jam win against Oral Roberts. Burnett. a junior, acknowledged how important a loss can be, especially against a program like Creighton, for the maturation process of his team.

"It was a big measuring stick, they are a top ten team that can shoot it and guard it," Burnett said, "We fought, we were leading that game for 26 minutes and that shows what kind of team we're capable for having. We give that effort for 40 minutes instead of 26 minutes and who knows."

To add to the difficulty of their upcoming schedule, Ole Miss is about to enter exam week. Student-athletes, even at Ole Miss, cannot escape the harsh reality of cumulative reviews and term papers.

"You get into exams which are never easy," Kennedy said,

"They're gonna test these guys in other aspects."

All in all, Ole Miss fans will have plenty to keep their eye on over the coming weeks. The Rebs play Middle Tennessee and Memphis at home on Wednesday and Saturday respectively and then take a brief road trip to Virginia Tech before heading back home to face Murray State next Thursday.

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### Rebels work to improve defensive play this season

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Since before the season began, Ole Miss basketball hasn't had any trouble scoring. With five players averaging double-digits and 36 points per game between the newly arrived duo of Deandre Burnett and Cullen Neal, this squad has plenty of firepower. The mystery so far, and the story that could define the rest of the season, is whether Head Coach Andy Kennedy's defense can keep up with the scoring of the offense.

While the Rebels flashed serious talent at the Paradise Jam in the Virgin Islands last week, the defense was a key reason that Ole Miss could not follow through on a near-upset over 10th-ranked Creighton. Burnett and his teammates led the Bluejays for much of the game, but couldn't maintain their early intensity and focus until the final buzzer.

"We were leading that game for 26 minutes. If we can give that type of effort for 40 minutes instead of 26 minutes then, who knows, maybe Ole Miss would be ranked right now," Burnett said.

Despite failing to protect its lead against Creighton and ultimately losing by nine points, the defense has improved as the season has progressed. Poor defense has caused unnecessarily close games since the Rebels' exhibition win against Morehouse when they led by only single dig-

its at halftime. Since then, five of their six games have finished with a margin of less than 10 points. Burnett, Kennedy and Neal all posited that a lack of communication could be the largest factor to blame for defensive struggles.

"Once we start communicating better and trusting each other a little more on the court I think our defense will start progressing better," Neal said.

This could be a point of hope for Rebel fans as it suggests more of an issue with chemistry than an issue with talent. Time spent playing, practicing and learning together could alleviate many of the hardships this new team faces. Fans can also breathe easy as Ole Miss has played thus far without its best shot-blocker Nate Morris, who was suspended for a violation of team rules earlier in the year. While the exact date of his return is uncertain, his reach should greatly impact the defensive end upon his return.

In the meantime, the young Rebels are faced with a difficult situation in which they must focus on learning and communication in order to improve defensively while keeping an eye on upcoming matchups with Middle Tennessee and Memphis. Ole Miss needs time to mature and form a cohesive defensive mindset while also pushing the limits against other top-tier NCAA talent.

The weeks ahead will reveal a number of things and, if Neal
