# The First Annual Oxford Conference For The Book

The University of Mississippi • Oxford, Mississippi April 2-4, 1993 he first Oxford Conference for the Book will bring together a wide variety of book lovers to discuss the impact of contemporary book culture on the South today. Teachers, librarians, booksellers, writers, agents, editors, scholars, and publishers will gather at the University of Mississippi the first weekend in April to celebrate the region's writers and to discuss the dependence of the literary arts upon practical concerns: literacy, freedom of expression, and the book trade itself. The program will include readings by outstanding authors, as well as panel discussions and addresses by some of the most noteworthy people involved in book culture today. The conference will begin on Friday evening, April 2, with the awards ceremony of the Mississippi Institute of Arts and Letters, open to the public for the first time this year. Activities will conclude on Sunday afternoon with the Fortieth Birthday Party for the Paris Review and the opening of a special Paris Review poster exhibition at the University Museums. Participants who arrive on Friday may wish to take one of several tours of the area.



### **SPEAKERS**

JOHN Y. COLE is a librarian and historian and the founding director of the Center for the Book at the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C.

LIZ DARHANSOFF is a literary agent with Darhansoff and Verrill Literary Agency in New York.

LARRY BROWN is the author of two novels, *Dirty Work* and *Joe*, and two short story collections, *Facing the Music* and *Big Bad Love*. He is presently completing a work of nonfiction, *Fire Notes*, based on his experiences as a captain in the Oxford Fire Department.

THOMAS FREELAND is an Oxford attorney and board member of the American Civil Liberties Union in Mississippi.

KAYE GIBBONS is the author of the novels Ellen Foster, A Virtuous Woman, and A Cure for Dreams. Her latest book is Remedies Against Time (Putnam).

BARRY HANNAH is the author of ten works of fiction, including the landmark collection of short stories *Airships* and the novels *Geronimo Rex*, *Ray*, and *Never Die*. His latest collection of short stories is *Bats Out of Hell* (Seymour Lawrence/Houghton Mifflin). He is currently writer-in-residence at the University of Mississippi.

JAMES LINVILLE is managing editor of the Paris Review.

WILLIE MORRIS is former editor of Harper's and the author of Good Old Boy, North Toward Home, The Courting of Marcus Dupree, and After All, It's Only a Game. His newest work, New York Days (Little, Brown), will appear this summer.

MARY OLIVER is the author of seven books of poetry, including *American Primitive*, which won the Pulitzer Prize in 1983, and *New and Selected Poems*, which won the National Book Award for poetry in 1992. She is currently writer-in-residence at Sweet Briar College in Virginia.

ARTHUR PEYTON is a former chairman of the National Association of State Boards of Education and a past member of the Mississippi State Board of Education.

PHIL PFEFFER is chairman and chief executive officer of Nashville-based Ingram's Distribution Group Inc., the largest book distributor in North America.

GEORGE PLIMPTON is a founding editor of the *Paris Review* and the author of, among other books, *Paper Lion*, *Shadow Box*, and *X-Factor*. He has edited many works, including the *Norton Anthology of Sports Literature*, and has recently completed the ninth volume of the *Writers at Work* series of *Paris Review* interviews.

SHANNON RAVENEL is editor-in-chief of Algonquin Books of Chapel Hill as well as the editor of its annual collection *New Stories* from the South. For over ten years she has been the series editor for *Best American Short Stories*.

ELAINE H. SCOTT is a literacy advocate and a member of the Arkansas State Board of Education.

MARY GAY SHIPLEY is the owner of The Bookrack in Blytheville, Arkansas, and is secretary of the American Booksellers Association.

INA STERN is marketing director at Algonquin Books of Chapel Hill.

CATHY STEWART is a public school teacher and the coeditor of Books We Can't Resist, a collection of book reviews written by young children.

WILLIAM STYRON is the author of many novels, including Set This House on Fire, Lie Down in Darkness, The Confessions of Nat Turner, and Sophie's Choice, all of which have recently been reissued as Vintage International Editions. His newest work, A Tidewater Morning: Tales from Youth (Random House), will appear in September.

OREN TEICHER is president of the American Booksellers Foundation for Free Expression and government affairs director of the American Booksellers Association.

CHARLES REAGAN WILSON is the coeditor of the *Encyclopedia of Southern Culture* and is an associate professor of History and Southern Studies at the University of Mississippi.

The fee does not include tours, which are \$40 per person, or the cocktail buffet on Friday night, which is an additional \$25. A check made payable to the University of Mississippi should be submitted with the registration form below. The student certification section of the registration form must be completed for all registrants who pay the \$25 fee. Registrants who contributed to the Center between April 1992 and March 1993 are eligible for the \$45 fee.

Admission to the conference is limited. Applications with checks will be accepted in the order in which they are received. A refund will be made, less a \$20 service charge, provided cancellations of reservations are made in writing and postmarked no later than March 22.

The PARIS REVIEW was founded in 1953 by George Plimpton, Peter Matthiessen, and Harold L. Hume, and rapidly became a literary landmark with its consistent publication of established authors and promising new ones. The early "Paris Review crowd" included William Styron, who wrote the preface for the first number, James Baldwin, Terry Southern, and Irwin Shaw. A list of early contributors reads like a virtual Who's Who in arts and letters, including Samuel Beckett, Simone Weil, Adrienne Rich, Thom Gunn, Italo Calvino, and many others. The Paris Review is also famous for its Writers at Work interviews and its fiction anthologies.

SQUARE BOOKS: Oxford's literary bookstore is a local source of cappuccino, books, and good conversation for Oxford authors Barry Hannah, Larry Brown, John Grisham, and a growing number of aspiring writers. The bookstore has also been featured in *Time*, *Newsweek*, *Southern Living*, *Entertainment Weekly*, and *Metropolitan Home*. One of the busiest establishments on the Oxford Square, Square Books has hosted readings by Richard Ford, Peter Matthiessen, Robert Stone, Ann Beattie, Gloria Steinem, and many others. ROWAN OAK, WILLIAM FAULKNER'S HOME, was built by a pioneer settler in 1844 and bought by Faulkner in 1930. This plantation-style house was his home until his death in 1962. Open 10:00 a.m.-noon and 2:00-4:00 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday and 2:00-4:00 p.m. Sunday. Closed Mondays and on Easter Sunday, July 4, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Eve, and Christmas Day. UNIVERSITY MUSEUMS: The Mary Buie Museum (1939) and the adjoining Kate Skipwith Teaching Museum (1976) house collections representing the fields of art, anthropology, decorative arts, history, science, and technology. Outstanding collections include the David M. Robinson Collection of Greek and Roman antiquities, the Millington-Barnard Collection of nineteenth-century scientific instruments, and the Southern Folk Art collection, centered on the paintings of Oxford artist Theora Hamblett. UNIVERSITY OF MISSISSIPPI LIBRARY DEPARTMENT OF ARCHIVES AND SPECIAL COLLECTIONS: Over 300 manuscript collections and over 20,000 volumes of Mississippiana are housed here. Among its permanent exhibits are William Faulkner's Nobel Prize and signed first editions and manuscripts. Open 8:30 a.m.-5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, except for University holidays. UNIVERSITY OF MISSISSIPPI BLUES ARCHIVE: This research collection on music contains books, periodicals, recordings, films, photographs, and posters. Of special interest are the B.B. King collection, the Kenneth S. Goldstein Folklore Collection, and the Living Blues Archival Collection. Materials do not circulate.
